Introduction

Dubai, the leading business hub in the Middle East, functions as a vital global transportation centre for both passengers and cargo. Initially driven by oil revenue, its economic focus has now shifted to tourism, aviation, real estate, and financial services. The city's commercial sector is rapidly expanding due to substantial investments, attracting global investors and brands. Despite its modernity, Dubai preserves distinctive customs and traditions essential for business success. For a successful business trip to Dubai, here are some tips from your arrival onward:

Business Etiquette

Dubai's business etiquette is characterised by formality. When greeting hosts, shake hands with men, and for women, place your right hand over your heart. Exchanging business cards after initial greetings is customary, so ensure you have an ample supply of quality cards.

Business attire in Dubai leans toward conservatism. Simplicity and elegance are preferred, so avoid flashy or extravagant clothing. Women should steer clear of low necklines and short skirts, while both men and women should avoid overly tight attire, which may be impractical and uncomfortable, especially during the hot summer months.

Business Hours: Fridays and Ramadan

It's important to avoid scheduling business activities on Fridays, as it's a day of prayer and rest in this Muslim Emirate. Instead, opt for Sundays, which operate as usual workdays. Office hours generally span from 8 am to 1 pm and 4 pm to 8 pm, Sunday through Thursday.

During Ramadan, a significant religious observance in Dubai, the business landscape adapts to the spiritual nature of the month. Meetings are often rescheduled to more suitable times, and business dinners are typically held after iftar, the meal that breaks the fast.

Language

While English serves as the primary business language in Dubai, making an effort to learn a few Arabic phrases, such as the greeting "As-salamu alaykum" can leave a positive impression.






International Airports

Dubai is served by two airports: Dubai Airport (DXB) and Al Maktoum Airport (DWC). DXB reigns as the city's primary international airport, holding the title of the world's busiest airport for international passenger traffic. It's also the fifth busiest worldwide for overall passenger numbers, a hub for Airbus A380 and Boeing 777 movements, and renowned for the highest average passengers per flight. Located in the Al Garhoud district, DXB spans 7,200 acres of land. Terminal 3, its centrepiece, ranks as the world's second-largest building by floor space and the planet's largest airport terminal.

For travellers, DXB offers unmatched convenience as it sits closest to Dubai's city centre. Various transportation options, including metro trains, buses, shuttles, taxis, and car rentals, seamlessly connect the airport to central Dubai, with a swift 30-minute taxi ride to the heart of the city.





Getting into Dubai









Dubai International Airport offers travellers a multitude of transportation options to reach the vibrant city centre. Whether you prefer the efficiency of the metro, the convenience of buses, the flexibility of taxis, or the modern ease of rideshare services, Dubai ensures a seamless journey to its heart.

Metro

This is a convenient and efficient way to travel from the airport to the city centre. The Red Line of the Dubai Metro connects the airport to key destinations in the city. The metro stations at the airport are conveniently located within the terminals.

Bus

The fastest option is the Express Bus 13B to Al Qusais Bus Station in Dubai city centre. They run every 30 minutes from the Dubai bus station at the airport, outside Terminal 2, and the journey takes around 40 minutes.

*You'll need to have a NoI transport card so you can travel using the public transport. You can't pay the driver on the bus. Nol cards are available to purchase from the ticket machines at arrivals (in all three terminals).

Taxi

Taxis are readily available at Dubai International Airport, and they offer a convenient doorto-door service to the city centre. The journey takes around 20-30 minutes, depending on traffic conditions. Taxis accept both cash and credit cards for fare payment. The fares are metered, and there may be additional charges for airport pick-up.

Rideshare Services

Uber and Careem are popular rideshare options in Dubai. Download the respective app, create an account, and request a ride to your destination.





Transport Options

Exploring Dubai's diverse landscape is made easy with a wide array of transportation options catering to every traveller's preference.

Travelling by rail

Dubai's world-class metro system, operational since September 2009, is known for its affordability, safety, and reliability. It efficiently connects you to the city's main attractions. All metro stations feature designated areas for women, the elderly, and the disabled. To enhance your commute, download the RTA Dubai app for comprehensive information and assistance.

Travelling by bus

With over 1,500 air-conditioned buses, Dubai's budget-friendly bus network is extensive. Air-conditioned shelters provide comfort at most bus stops, and buses run frequently for hassle-free commuting. Additionally, consider booking a hop-on, hop-off tour for a quick and fun-filled tourist experience, available for online booking or at major malls.

Travelling by water

Embrace tradition by commuting via sea on the iconic abra wooden boats, accessible from designated creekside stations in Bur Dubai or Deira. You can hire a private abra for sightseeing, starting at AED 60 for half an hour. Inspired by the abra, modern Dubai water taxis offer scenic waterfront journeys to over 40 stops.

Travelling by foot

For those who prefer exploring on foot, Dubai offers well-planned walkways with clear signboards guiding your way. Pedestrian over-bridges link different areas, ensuring safe crossings on highways.

Travelling by bicycle or scooter

If you seek a more adventurous experience, Dubai provides government-regulated two-wheeler options. Electric scooters are a common sight in neighbourhoods like Jumeirah Lakes Towers, Downtown Dubai, and Dubai Internet City, available for rent from various operators, including Skurtt, Tier, and Lime. Alternatively, the Careem BIKE Dubai app offers bicycle rentals at tourist hotspots such as Dubai Marina, Jumeirah, Dubai Water Canal, Deira, and more, marking the region's first large-scale bike-sharing initiative.




Hotel Options


